GENERAL INFORMATION

The Southeastern Normal School was created by the Legislature of 1908-09. Appropriations were made in the sum of \$100,000 for the administration building, and a faculty of 30 was employed for the first year. The city of Durant provided quarters for the school in the Presbyterian College and its dormitories, and a temporary auditorium erected at a cost of \$2,000. The scholastic year of 1909-10 has been very successful, the enrollment reaching over 600 in addition to the enrollment of the two summer sessions of 1909-10. A class of five graduated from the regular course in May.

In accordance with the conviction that a normal school is properly a school for the training of teachers and neither a high school nor a college, it has been the aim of the management throughout to subordinate all academic work to professional. To this end particular emphasis has been placed upon the courses in Psychology, History and Philosophy of Education, and the Model School. The plan of dividing the year into units of six weeks each is also calculated to offer advantages to teachers who have only a limited time in which to do credit work.

The facilities for academic work however, are sufficient to meet the demands of even university requirements. In order to more properly correlate with the university, and the high schools the academic work has been placed in the sub-normal course, embracing the first four years, and is equivalent, if not superior to the best high school courses; a certificate from this course admits without examination to the first year of the university; while the two years of the normal proper, consisting largely of professional work entitle to advanced credits in the university.

LOCATION

The present quarters occupy the old Presbyterian College, together with the adjoining dormitory building, the S. W. Stone residence and two small cottages situated near the main college building and used for class rooms. A beautiful new building is being erected by the State at the cost of One Hundred Thousand Dollars. The site of the new building occupies twenty acres adjoining the city on the north, with cement walks leading up to the entrance of the campus. At the opening of the year 1911, the school expects to be established in the new normal building.

LITERARY SOCIETIES

A literary society for young men was organized during the year 1909-10, under the name of the Websterian Debating Club, which has done very successful work in debating and parliamentary drill.

ATHLETICS

The football team was organized early in the fall of 1909 and rose at once to prominence, defeating three of the other Normal schools of the State and being defeated only by Epworth University

and the A. and M. College. The basketball team was also very successful, winning a great majority of the games played.

SUMMER SCHOOL

The career of the Southeastern State Normal was begun with the Summer Session of 1909. Several counties adjoining Bryan County combined with the Southeastern for the purpose of holding a joint institute. This lasted from June 15th to August 1st and was attended by over eight hundred teachers. The summer Session of 1910 lasted from May 30th to June 24th. Nine counties combined with the Southeastern, each furnishing two or more instructors. This, with the addition of the regular members of the Normal faculty, gave the institute a teaching force of forty-seven members.

ALUMNI ASSOCIATION

Realizing the immense influence that the alumni of an institution wield when properly organized, the class of 1910 organized itself into an Alumni Association immediately upon graduation, under a constitution calculated to secure the best unity and inspire the organization to its best efforts. As soon as the list of graduates shall have reached a sufficient number the Association expects to undertake some definite purpose such as establishing a scholarship or instituting a memorial.

SUTDENT PUBLICATION

The Southeastern Normalite is a magazine issued six times a year by the student body. In it are published the best original literary efforts of the students, together with such school news as may be of general interest.

Cafeteria

In the summer of 1919 the sate added a cafeteria to the equipment of this Normal School. The building originally erected as a barracks for the S. A. T. C., has been taken over by the state and rebuilt.

Ladies Rooming Facilities

The business men of Durant formed a corporation with a capitalization of \$100,000 to provide rooming facilities for ladies at moderate coast and at a convenient distance from the Normal School under the direction of the Dean of Women. A block of land has been purchased within half a block of the Normal Campus and upon this a well-furnished dormitory, capable of accommodating thirty young ladies has been erected. The building is thoroughly modern and contains large reception and reading rooms as well as matron's office, etc.
